### Work and the Created Order: Questions

- 1. How does knowing that you are created in the image of a God who works and whose good design for you is work change the way you view work?
- 2. If we view our legal work as work in service of God, how does it change what we do for our clients or boss or how we treat our opponents?
- 3. Does the idea of government and law before the fall surprise you? What sort of law might there have been pre-fall and why? Does that change the way you view different areas of the law?
- 4. 'The result and purpose of God's commandments, God's word, God's law, is good' (e.g Gen 1:9 'And God said...And it was so...And God saw that it was good'). Does that change what you ultimately seek to achieve at work for your clients and colleagues? Does it alter what you consider should ultimately guide you in what you seek for them?

# Work and the Fall: Questions

- 1. In what ways do you consider your work 'painful toil' (Genesis 3:17)? What 'thistles and thorns' (3:18) do you encounter? Can you relate to the statement 'by the sweat of your brow you will eat your food' (3:19)?
- 2. What fallen purposes or motives do you or lawyers generally have for practising in the law?
- 3. How does your work serve God by administering His common grace?
- 4. What does the bible say about your area of the law and what difference does that make to your practice?

# Work and the Gospel: Questions

- 1. What impact does God's grace have on your view of legal work? What impact does it/might it have on you day-to-day as a lawyer?
- 2. How does the example of Jesus help you day-to-day as a lawyer? (e.g. 1 Peter 2:18-25)
- 3. How does working for the "Lord Christ" alter your view of work and how might it change it in practice?
- 4. Who or what is at the heart of your identity?
- **5.** Discuss experiences of sharing the good news of Jesus with a colleague and pray together for one or two colleagues and your witness to them.

- 1. Have you considered the idea that there will be work in the New Creation?
- 2. What role do you think lawyers will have in the New Creation?
